2. Strategic approaches to successful student engagement and wellbeing

This short input will explore research evidence on engagement and wellbeing around the following questions: What are learner engagement and student wellbeing? Why are they important in the context of (online) learning? The session will explore the notion of an engagement and relational culture as a strategic response to successful engagement and wellbeing

Dr Parimala Veluvali's abstract:

In India's evolving online education landscape, ensuring student engagement and wellbeing is both a challenge and an opportunity. This case study showcases the strategic initiatives of Symbiosis School for Online and Digital Learning (SSODL), where student-centric practices such as clubs, peer learning groups, and community engagement have built a vibrant virtual learning community. A notable

achievement is the inclusion of Afghan students, who, despite challenging circumstances, have accessed flexible education and participated in social projects from their locations. These efforts have fostered academic engagement, emotional support, and a sense of belonging. This presentation will highlight how a thoughtful mix of academic rigor, co-curricular initiatives, and faculty mentorship enhances student experience and retention in online learning environments.

3. Assessment for student success

This contribution aims to give participants the opportunity to reflect on the reform and redesign of distance and online assessment for their academic programmes. The COVID19 emergency in 2020 created the widespread move to online space for assessment as face-to-face examinations became impossible, followed very quickly by the widespread disruption of AI into the world of education in early 2023. The need to rethink assessment from perspectives of support to learning, academic integrity, the protection of academic standards and professional regulations, and perhaps more fundamentally the character of higher education are all essential.
