From “screen writings” to post-Internet expressions. A French perspective on digital textualities

Gustavo Gomez-Mejia (Université de Tours, Prim)

To which extent can we conceptualise digital artifacts through the lenses of the Humanities? As present-day digital humanists and Internet researchers, what is the amount of attention that we devote to contextualising contemporary technologies within the frame of a larger cultural history? Are these questions symptomatic of how we may feel indebted to a particular intellectual tradition?

With such reflections in mind, this conference aims at acquainting English-speaking scholars with a localised French perspective on digital textualities. Drawing upon the seminal works of Emmanuël Souchier and Yves Jeanneret, in the framework of what has been called a “screen writing” theory (*théorie des écrits d’écran*), we will see how a Sorbonne-based literary heritage ended up developing an original set of concepts for analysing digital objects as diverse as software programs, cd-roms, websites, blogs, social media platforms and apps. By discussing their “socio-semiotic” approach throughout a testimonial research journey (1999-2022), we will reflect upon the cultural value of a series of globalised post-Internet expressions (neologisms, buzzwords, Internet jargon) which may challenge our views as digital humanists with a shared interest for screen-intensive practices and contemporary literacies.
